EDITORIAL

What an excellent afternoon at Newnham with their Village History Day! Clearly a great deal of work had been put in by Penny Alexander and her team to provide a most interesting and informative exhibition.

Congratulations to you all.

And not forgetting of course those who provided the teas. The cakes (at least the ones we tried) were delicious, and the tea brewed to perfection. Thank you.

There is an interesting unofficial trial going on at present in the House of Commons, with one side almost all wearing masks and the other side almost exclusively not. It will be enlightening to see whether one side goes down with more cases than the other!

So are we approaching the end of the pandemic? Or at least reaching a steady state where we accept that Covid is endemic and will be with us for ever? I for one am optimistic and believe that we are. There was no sign of the new wave in July which we were promised by the experts; the schools have now been back for a couple of weeks with no sign of a spike; as I write (on 21st Sept.) the case numbers nationally are falling; and hospitalisations and deaths are levelling off. The death rate from Covid is lower than that from flu. The great majority of the adult population has been vaccinated, and an even larger proportion is immune due to exposure to the virus.

THE RECTOR'S LETTER

Why October 3 I st was a scary day for the church – and a joyful one

To some, October 31st is All Hallows Eve, to others it is Halloween and to others still it is called Reformation Day. It has the latter name because on October 31st 1517 a German Monk called Martin Luther nailed a list of objections (called his 95 Theses) to the practices of the church in his day to the church door in the small university town of Wittenberg. It sounds dramatic, but it was only the 16st century equivalent of posting something online.

Luther didn't expect to cause a big stir, but the Roman Catholic Church hierarchy (the only church of the day) came down on him hard. Again and again they tried to silence him, but the more they pushed him and threatened him the more Luther went back to the Bible and looked at what it really said.

And the more Luther did that the more he realised that the church in his time had moved away from the amazing Good News of Jesus.

Eventually Luther was forced out of the Church, he ended up being kidnapped by a local prince for his own protection and even marrying an ex-nun after being hidden in a castle and translating the Bible from Latin to German, something that had previously been illegal.

Through all this, Luther discovered that he wasn't alone. First and foremost, he

realised he had the love, support, hope and strength of God who wanted the Good News (or "Gospel") to be shared but also there was an increasing number of men and women across Europe who began protesting in a similar way – Bucer, Zwingli and Calvin in mainland Europe and Latimer, Ridley and Cranmer here amongst many others

These protesters lent their name to the churches their founded - the "Protestant" church of which the Anglican Church of England is part. These weren't new

churches, they were the Church reformed, made to be once more what Jesus had intended it to be; places of hope, truth and welcome, places where the Bible (God's Word) was read, faithfully (and engagingly) taught, understood and applied.

The Church isn't perfect because its full of imperfect people (take for example yours truly), but

thanks to the reformers we have been granted places of worship in our communities that at least seek to be the fellowships of believers and enquirers that together explore and discover the just and holy God of grace, love and mercy.

That was scary for the Church 500 years ago, but in the end October 31st is the source of great joy.

Happy Reformation Day, folks! Best wishes.

RECTOR'S INDUCTION



The running of the Parish would then be managed by West Northamptonshire Council. All Parish Councillors are unpaid volunteers, working for the good of us all. Parish Council Meetings -The next two meetings of Newnham Parish Council will be on Monday October 4th and then November 1st, both at 7.30pm in The Village Hall.

The agenda for these meeting will be on the parish web site, www.newnham-parish.org.ukand also on the parish notice boards.

Parish Open Meeting – This was held on 13th September and was well attended. The main talking point was traffic calming. A third vehicle speed indicator device is being purchased by the parish council. When in place, this will give us a second machine able to record data which we can forward to the Police and Highways to support our request for action be taken, police camera vans, speed humos etc etc.

There was universal agreement that wild flower areas should be created using grassed areas we currently mow. This was agreed to be discussed and hopefully actioned for next spring. The abbreviated minutes will be on Facebook and the notice boards.

Handy Person -The successful applicant has now been appointed and has commenced work.

Parish Web Site – We invite local businesses and organisations to advertise their services or meetings on the Parish web site. There is no charge for this service although any contributions would be most welcome. Please contact: admin@newnham-parish.or.u.k.

Street Doctor - If you notice any damage to the road surfaces around the village e.g. potholes, please report the problem at; https://limmystreet.northamptonshire.gov.uk/. You can also report blocked or overflowing drains or anything else to do with the roads/verges which concerns you.

Dog Fouling—There is still a problem around the village with dog owners not picking up after their animals. We have joined the PaintmeansPoo campaign. It was agreed the parish council will join this campaign to highlight the ongoing problems with inconsiderate dog owners allowing dog fouling. If you own and walk a dog, please take a bag with you to pick up after your animal.

Burial Ground – The Highways Authority have agreed to erect signage above the burial ground gates to warn motorists of pedestrians potentially entering or leaving the Burial Ground. The verge above the gates will be strimmed and flattened to allow for extra parking.

Mounts Way / Poets Lane Junction –At this dangerous junction, two new mirrors are to be purchased then erected to allow drivers to see oncoming traffic. Purchasing of the mirrors is in process.

Litter Pick – There will be another village litter pick to take place on October 24th. The date is to be agreed by the parish council and will be publicised nearer the time.
