

THE RECTOR'S LETTER

SHOCK DISCOVERY – VICAR MAKES MISTAKE!

Hold the front page – yes, its true, the vicar is far from perfect, but you probably knew that already. Let me give you a small example of my fallibility, last month I told you in this feature that the Hope Explored

course would begin at the end of March but that is simply not true. Please accept my apologies, Hope Explored begins on Monday 20th February at 7.00pm, so please register by Friday 17th of this month if you would like to join us.

The reality is that we all make mistakes, we are all imperfect and vicars, in fact all Christians, are no better than anyone else. But here's the difference – first of all, Christians know that we fall short of the grade for being perfect. We know that if you measured us against our perfect and holy God then we would fall ridiculously below his standard.

Now, you would think that that such a knowledge would result in Christians being the most miserable people you could bump in to – we know that God is holy and we also know that we are far from anything that could be classed as holy – how depressing. And yet, secondly, Christians should be the most joyful people you know (apologies if that's not always the case) and why are we joyful?

Because we have hope.

The three sessions of Hope Explored look at hope, peace and then purpose. For Christians all these come from a real and living relationship with Jesus who is God himself. Through knowing him, Christians discover hope in a hopeless world, peace in a fractured society and purpose in a life fraught with dead ends.

> These are linked to the discovery that despite the fact we aren't good enough to match the standards of a holy and just deity, God isn't angry with us, or mocking us or simply despairing of us. Amazingly God loves us and he loves us beyond anything we had conceived or deserve, even though he knows that we are such epic failures a lot of the time.

That's why I want to invite you to Hope Explored, beginning this month at Badby. I want you to share in the hope and peace and purpose that Christians know. I'm not going to try to convince you, but we would love to help you explore that for yourself. WEATHER RECORDS

Once again I am grateful to Edgar Mobbs of Newnham and June Pound of Charwelton for their assiduous recording of rainfall in their respective villages.

Charwelton was again the wetter of the two villages with a total rainfall of 730.2mm whereas Newnham had only 717.5mm. The driest month of the year was July, (no surprise there!), with 8.5mm (N) and 12.0 (C), while

November was the wettest at 130.5mm (N) and 149mm (C).

So what about previous years? In 2021 we had 760mm, while the wettest year during the period of our records (1993-2022) was 2012 when we had 1136mm rain, and the driest was 2005 with 517mm. Thus rainfall in 2022 was rather less than the mean of the last 30 years, and was a little drier than the previous year. So, in terms of rainfal at least, a rather average year.

THE CHAPEL OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD

Did you know that's its name? Originally consecrated as a Methodist Chapel in 1887, in 1931 it was purchased by Sir Charles Knightley for use as a chapel-of-ease to Holy Trinity Church.

Last year we mentioned we were raising funds for our chapel which is in need of a little TLC, not least to repair some of the windows, to do some repointing of the brickwork, to repair the clock and to refresh the decor. The need became more urgent when, on New Year's day, we arrived for Evensong to find the chapel dark and chilly. The elderly electrics had

tripped the circuit breaker (not surprising, given that one of the wall heaters originated in York about 40 years ago). Once we'd isolated the problem and restored the lights, and with a bit of hearty singing. we soon warmed up.

But there is another problem needing immediate attention. As anyone who has tried to get into the chapel recently might have noticed, the outer door has warped very slightly, making entry difficult. (Don't be put off; the door will open if you push hard enough. Being open daily, it's an ideal place to pop in and spend a little time away from the hubbub of the outside world.) We have started securing quotes for the necessary work and, with your support, we aim to restore this community gem. Watch out for fund-raising events during the year, the first of which is advertised below.


